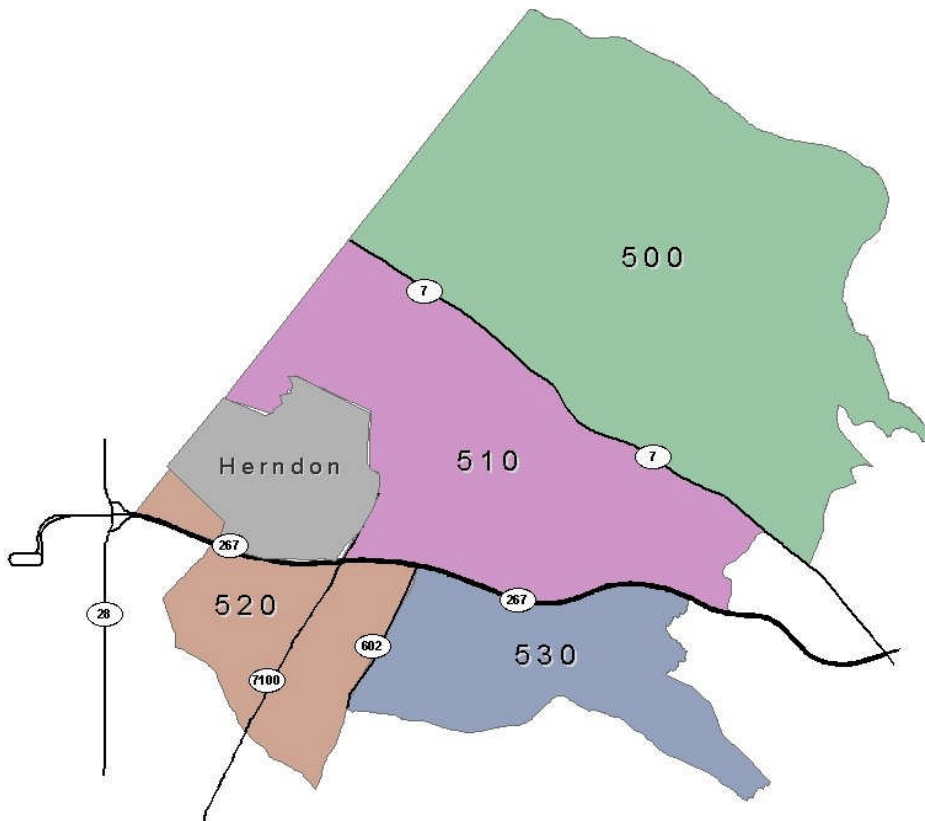

RESTON POLICE SERVICE AREAS (PSA)

Internet On-Line or Telephone Reporting

This is an alternative reporting method for a crime or incident that occurred in Fairfax County. An online or telephoned report is for insurance and Police information purposes only. Information obtained by this report assists in preventing future crimes by analyzing trends, locations and times of violations. It may also assist in the identification and return of stolen property recovered as the result of other investigations. If you are aware of the identity of the suspect, you may only use this online report if you do not wish to pursue criminal prosecution.

You cannot use this online form to report:

- Any incident that occurred in the past 30 minutes.
- Any type of violent crime (whether completed or attempted), including, but not limited to: assault, kidnapping, robbery.
- Any type of sex crime (whether completed or attempted), including, but not limited to: rape or sexual assault.
- Any theft or loss of a firearm.
- Any type of stolen vehicle (whether completed or attempted), including, but not limited to: cars, trucks, trailers, motorcycles.
- Any type of stolen license plate.
- Any incident (whether completed or attempted) involving breaking and entering of your home or business.
- Any type of traffic accident, including a hit and run, whether or not an injury occurred.
- Any crimes committed against a person due to their race, religion, ethnic or national origin, disability and/or sexual orientation.

You can use this on-line form to report:

- Alcohol Violations
- Civil Disputes
- Destruction of Property
- Disorderly Conduct
- Larceny up to \$5000
- Loitering
- Lost Property

- Noise Violations
- Prescription Fraud/Forgery
- Solicitor Violations
- Suspicious Events/Persons/Vehicles
- Trespassing
- Telephone Harassment
- Telephone Threats
- Vehicle Tampering
- Fraudulent use of checks and credit cards.
- Aggressive driving.

If you request a case number, one will be provided to you for your records and insurance purposes. Your report will normally be processed within 72 hours.

If your incident is not eligible for online reporting or you would like an officer to respond, please call (703) 691-2131.

Incident Reports and Weekly Activity Reports

The FCPD Public Information Office posts Incident Reports and the Weekly Activity Report online as these documents are created.

Incident Reports: news releases disseminated throughout the day describing investigations, crimes, incidents, accidents and media advisories.

Weekly Activity Report: a summary of crimes and incidents (major crime, property crime and animal-related incidents) occurring in Fairfax County within the past week. It is compiled and released every Friday.

To access the Police website, follow these steps:

1. Go to the main Fairfax County Government website, located at www.fairfaxcounty.gov
2. Select 'Public Safety'
3. Select 'Police Department'
4. On the main Police website, select 'Crime Information' in the left column
5. In the first paragraph, select 'Daily Incident Reports' or 'Weekly Incident Activity Summaries'
6. Finally, select 'Weekly Summary Listing of Incidents & Crime' or 'Archived Daily Incident Reports' to access information released within the past two months

Demographic Reports

Fairfax County Demographic Reports and its data tables are available on the county's Web site <<http://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/aboutfairfax/default.htm>> . The Demographic Reports contain statistical information on the county's current and forecasted population and housing units, residential units in the development process, nonresidential structure gross floor area and current and planned land use. Data are presented by supervisor district, planning district, census and subcensus tract, and the county as a whole. These data tables are available online in PDF and Excel formats.

The Reston District Station Crime Prevention Unit offers a wide range of training and services covering many topics to provide personal safety.

Some of the topics include:

Identity Theft Prevention. Learn techniques to reduce the possibility of being the victim of fraud or forgery involving your checking or credit card accounts.

Juvenile Crime Prevention. Many subtopics designed to steer children away from a path of crime.

"Refuse To Be a Victim." Increase your awareness to avoid potentially dangerous situations.

"Sexual Assault Free and Empowered (SAFE)." Police instructors teach females mental and physical tactics reduce the likelihood of being the victim of a sexual assault, as well as resisting sexual assaults.

Workplace Violence

Senior Crime Prevention. *Refuse to be a Victim* instruction geared toward the elderly. Many adult children attend this instruction with their elderly parents.

Shoplifting Prevention. Instruction geared toward businesses to reduce the incidences of shoplifting and other financial business losses.

Workplace Violence Prevention. Instruction geared toward businesses to reduce the incidences of violence targeting employees, and response techniques to heighten workplace safety.

Some of the services offered:

Neighborhood Watch. A nationally-recognized partnership between police and community that promotes neighbors to "be the eyes & ears of their community," reducing the incidence of crime.

Crime Prevention Through Environment Design (CPTED). Crime Prevention Officers trained and experienced in CPTED provide the following services:

Business security surveys. An on-site survey conducted by a crime prevention officer that offers tips to reduce crime.

Home security surveys. An on-site survey conducted by a crime prevention officer that offers tips to reduce crimes around a residence, such as burglary, larceny, and vandalism.
